## PASTOR'S PAGE: Summer Sabbatical Stillness

"Be still, and know that I am God."

Psalm 46:10

ast month I wrote about my experience with the Doxology program, the first installment of which was a sort of a re-boot camp for pastors. My participation in this renewal program is the first part of the two-part sabbatical plan I proposed to the church council as I came to a sabbatical year here in 2023. I didn't want to take several weeks of extended leave all at once, as I did in 2017. Instead, council approved a different approach. Part one involves my three trips to attend the Doxology program. Part two includes some extra time added to my vacation allotment for rest and further renewal. Now it's time for part two. I will be gone for three weeks in August, from August 1 through the 22<sup>nd</sup>.

In her recent New York Times column, Anglican priest Tish Harrison Warren wrote the following about sabbaticals: "For clergy, sabbaticals provide a break from the intense relational and spiritual pressure of running a church or a nonprofit. They are a time for preparation for the future, study, deep reading, prayer, goal setting, vocational discernment and renewal." While the three weeks I'm taking off this month are not nearly as long as a traditional sabbatical, I am looking forward to these extra consecutive weeks away to get off the treadmill of ministry for a bit and do some of the things Warren describes here. Some of you might remember the old "I Love Lucy" episode where Lucy and Ethel get jobs at the chocolate factory. Those chocolates come down the conveyer belt at them relentlessly. Lucy and Ethel have no time to reflect, no time to analyze, no time to refine how they do their jobs. They can only think about the next chocolate coming at them. Sometimes this is what parish ministry feels like, only it is sermons and crises coming at you. Over the first three weeks of August we will have Pastor Laurie Johnson handling the former as she steps in to preach and lead worship, and Pastor David Lura will be on call for the latter, responding to any emergencies. This time off will free up my brain to think about different things, to reflect, to study, and to set goals. I love the parish ministry treadmill and look forward to getting back on it, but some extra time away from it will help me do a better job when I do.

The word 'sabbatical' is related to the word 'sabbath,' the observance of which God commands for all his people in the Third Commandment. God knows all of us need times to refrain from working. God designed us to need rest. The traditional Jewish

observance of this commandment thus forbade all manner of labor. While this could be taken to legalistic extremes, such as when the disciples were accused of harvesting on the sabbath for merely picking at heads of grain for a snack (Matthew 12:1-2), the purpose of the commandment was, and is, to root people in the providence of God. It was, and is, to teach us to trust in God, and not our own labors, our own works. And so, while this commandment is indeed a gift to the bonetired, it also has a spiritual concern in mind.



"Be still, and know that I am God!"

Psalm 46:10 NRSV

"Be still, and know that I am God," God says to us through the psalmist. This verse from Psalm 46 captures the deeper purpose of sabbath rest. Physical, literal rest is important, but there is a spiritual purpose in being still as well. In being still we are reminded that God is God, and we are not. We are reminded that God is in control, not us. We are freed from the narcissistic delusions we often have about ourselves, and in this humbling we find the deeper rest that comes from relying on God in all things.

I feel like I should tell you that I will not literally be still while I am off for much of this month. I will be on the move. I will once again be helping my oldest son drive back to school at Texas A&M. Then I will be helping my middle son move back to his apartment at Washington State University. I will also be going on a few college campus visits with my youngest son, who is a senior in high school this year. I'm hoping for a little getaway for just me and my wife too. I've got miles of movement ahead of me! But as I disengage from my phone and set aside the lectionary for a few weeks, I will be still in a different way. My mind will be still, at rest, as I entrust you to the able care of Pastor Johnson and Pastor Lura, learning once again that Oak Harbor Lutheran is God's church, not mine.

I am so grateful for OHLC's sabbatical policy, for this gift of time. Thank you. I hope this summer brings opportunities for you to be still too. Pastors aren't the only ones facing a conveyer belt of demands. As you face yours, be still. Rest in the good news that God is God and you are not.

# FAITH TAMILY DAY AT THE MARINERS GAME!



or those who signed up for the OHLC trip to the Mariners game on **Saturday**, **August 26**, here are a few things you need to know. *Please read carefully*.

#### **Transportation**

We have two buses which will take us to T-Mobile Park. The buses will <u>leave</u> OHLC at 10 AM. Please be in the OHLC parking lot by 9:30 to check in and get your spot.

If you are NOT riding the bus, please let us know ahead of time by calling the church office.

#### **Tickets**

**T-Mobile Park now** exclusively uses digital ticketing. You will be contacted to arrange to have your tickets sent to your cell phone. If you do not have a smart phone, you will need to buddy up with someone who does. We will be in Section 331, rows 18, 19, and 20.

## Cashless policy

<u>T-Mobile Park is 100% cashless</u>. Cashless transactions for concessions and merchandise can be completed with a credit, debit or mobile pay (such as Apple Pay or Google Pay) option only.

## Ballpark policy on purses and bags

Clear plastic or vinyl bags no larger than 12" x 6" x 12" are permitted. One-gallon clear plastic zip-top bags are also allowed.

Security must be able to see inside and identify items to the bottom of the bag. Items may not be used to obscure the view of bag contents, including but not limited to non-clear bags, pouches, etc. Bags with interior contents obscured from view are not allowed.



Small clutch bags no larger than 4.5" x 6.5" are permitted. (do not have to be clear)

Backpacks, multi-compartment bags, duffle bags and purses larger than 4.5" x 6.5" are not permitted. Exceptions will be made for medically necessary items or single compartment diaper bags (child must be present).

Clear stadium-approved bags like the one pictured are available from Amazon and other retailers.

#### We're collecting items for Lutheran World Relief School Kits

It is time to take advantage of back-to-school sales and restock OHLC's supplies for Lutheran World Relief (LWR) school kits. OHLC strives to make 100 school kits annually. Last year, we made 125 kits!



Worldwide, these kits have provided children with the educational tools they need to succeed. According to LWR, many families in northern Iraq are unable to purchase school supplies for their children after years of conflict with ISIS. Recently, LWR has shipped 13,000 school kits to this war-torn region, providing students the supplies they need to return the normalcy of a school routine.

How can you help? We need LOTS of school supplies, especially notebooks! You can purchase items we need from the list below and/or donate money to help OHLC purchase satchels and pay for shipping costs. We're especially in need of the following items:

- ✓ **Pens**: black or blue ball point pens (NO gel pens)
- ✓ Crayons: 16 or 24 crayons per pack
- ✓ **Scissors**: children's blunt scissors
- ✓ **Rulers**: 30 cm METRIC rulers (okay if also has inches)
- ✓ **Notebooks**: 70-sheet spiral bound notebooks, 8 x 10.5", college or wide-ruled *[each kit gets 4 notebooks so we need a lot of these!]*

In 1904, with only \$1.50 to her name, Dr. Mary McLeod Bethune (1875-1955), founded the Daytona Educational and Industrial Training School for Negro Girls (now Bethune-Cookman University).



One of the youngest of 17 children, she was a daughter of former slaves in South Carolina. Throughout her life, Dr Bethune sought to uplift and to buttress the lives of Black Americans through education, politics, and strong leadership. Her endeavors were recognized by those she served, members of the press, presidents of the United States, First Lady Eleanor Roosevelt, and countless others impacted by her words.
