

Pastor's Page: For All the Saints

"Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight and the sin that clings so closely, and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us."

Hebrews 12:1

he passage above comes after a long, impressive list of those who have lived by faith. Although they have all gone on to glory, the author of Hebrews pictures them surrounding the church today as though they are in a great arena, cheering us on as we run the race of faith on the track below. I love this image. I think of it often.

I have my own personal cheering section in my office. To the left of my desk I have shelves with pictures of several departed saints whom I loved. There are former pastors of mine, including Pastor Bob Quello, who cheered for me when I discerned a call to go to seminary and whose emails encouraged me throughout my internship, even as he was battling cancer. He died before my ordination, but his widow honored the occasion by sending me his print of Paul Granlund's "Crucifixion," which hung in his pastor's study for many years. Now it hangs in mine, just above his photo. I also have a photo of my professor and friend of blessed memory, Dr. Jim Nestingen, whose wisdom about pastoral ministry just rings more and more true with each passing year. My colleague and friend Pastor Tim Hauge is there. He baptized Luke, my firstborn son. He loved rural ministry. He died in a farming accident while helping some parishioners bring in the harvest. My grandmother is there. She taught me more about Lutheran Christianity than anyone. She would have been 100 years old this year.

The first Sunday in November is All Saints Sunday. On this special Sunday we give thanks for all the saints. We especially remember those in our congregation who have died since last All Saints Sunday. These are the newest saints added to the cheering section of the Church Triumphant. We have some of our founding members on the list this year, including Don Fosso, Agnes Bos, and Gayle Glass. Don Fosso's father Oluf was one of OHLC's first pastors. Before Don moved to Florida, he lent me a box full of his father's hand-written sermons from during his tenure at OHLC, from 1939-1949. It was remarkable and encouraging to see the continuity between the gospel preached then and now. As Peter wrote, "The grass withers, and the flower falls, but the Word of the Lord endures forever" (1 Peter 1:25). Mike Morgan,

whose beautifully crafted crosses hang in the bedrooms of several years' worth of OHLC confirmands, is on the list. Ken Grigsby is there this year. What I wouldn't give to be able to talk to Ken about current events. His deep faith and deep reading of history always brought an interesting perspective to things. Karen Pedersen is on the list. After doing her memorial I had a vivid memory of her seeking me out in my office a few days after my mother died. She gave me a look that said, "grief recognizes grief." Without a word she pulled me into a hug and held me tight as my body shook in her arms. She was just a little thing, but boy was she strong — in so many ways.

These and all the other beloved departed saints we remember this year are now cheering us on from heaven. Their example of living by faith in Christ pushes us to keep going, to push through every challenge

facing the church, to run with perseverance through every trial or trauma we are enduring personally.

You have your own cheering section in this great cloud of witnesses. Maybe they are on this year's list. Maybe they died a long time ago. Maybe you will light a luminaria for them for our luminaria walk. Maybe



they are looking out at you from picture frames in hallways or on shelves. Their faith in Christ and our memories of their witness are the cheers that encourage us to keep running the race of faith, no matter what difficulties we're facing. Remember them. Give thanks for them. Let them encourage you.

I regret that I will not be with you this All Saints Sunday. I will be in Ohio for the second installment of the Doxology program for pastoral renewal. However, I can't think of a better pastor to lead worship on All Saints than Pastor Laurie Johnson. Not only does she have a long history with our congregation, but her full-time job is with hospice. Her compassionate heart has seen many a saint go marching in to the place Christ Jesus has prepared for them.

Although I will be in Ohio, I will be giving thanks for all the saints, both those cheering us on from heaven, and those I am honored to run alongside here at Oak Harbor Lutheran Church. Let us persevere together.

Welcome, Whidbey Island Youth Symphony!

Over the past several years, we've grown accustomed to students with Whidbey Island Brass and Penn Cove Brass using our sanctuary for occasional recitals and concerts, as well as spreading out over pretty much the entire building for their annual Brass Camp week in the summer.




