astor's age: Always Never the Same

"Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever."

Hebrews 13:8

"So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new!"


2 Corinthians 5:17

ountry music icon George Strait was once asked by a music critic if he thought he was limited by the genre to make albums that all sounded alike. It would have been easy to have been offended by such a snarky question, but Strait's response was as smooth as his legendary voice. He thoughtfully explained that there were indeed similarities between his albums, certain trademarks that his fans had come to expect, but that there was also enough variation to keep things interesting. "My albums are always never the same," he said. Somehow, it made sense. In 1999 he released an album called "Always Never the Same." In the title track he applies the same idea to a long-term romantic relationship, playing with the notion that what makes such a relationship rewarding is a mix of continuity and newness, the tension between stability and surprise. There are some parallels here to what we experience in worship and in the Christian life. Both are always never the same.

Before services our ushers used to sometimes ask me. "Anything special this morning?" To which I would respond, "Every Sunday is special!" After all, Jesus is speaking to us and feeding us with his body and blood. Pretty special, right? After getting this response once or twice, they changed tack, instead asking: "Is there anything *different* this morning?" What I want to say in response is, "Yes! There are different readings from scripture today, and different hymns, and several different people than were here last Sunday, and the people who were here last week have different things going on in their souls. Yes, so much is different! But also, no – it's the same. We have the same liturgy, the same patterns, the same things happening as pretty much every Sunday. It's always never the same." That's what I want to say, but I don't, because I understand that what the ushers are really asking is whether they need to do anything differently, and I don't want to drive these wonderful volunteers away with my own snarky remarks. But behind the snark lies a lot of truth. Our worship, which follows the historic Christian liturgy with

Lutheran accents, features continuity from Sunday to Sunday. People know what to expect. They know many parts by heart, and so can participate fully every week. At the same time, every Sunday is different, with parts that change from Sunday to Sunday and season by season. There is both continuity and newness, stability and surprise. It's always never the same.

This is true in our Christian lives as well. Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever (Hebrews 13:8). His gospel of the forgiveness of sins is unchanging. It is something we always need. At the same time, our lives are always changing. The Old Adam or Eve in us continues to come up



with new, increasingly sophisticated ways to sin alongside the old ways, while the Spirit continues to call out the new creation we are in Christ (2 Corinthians 5:17), coaxing out of us the fruits of the Spirit. As Martin Luther wrote, "This life therefore is not righteousness, but growth in righteousness, not health, but healing, not being but becoming, not rest but exercise. We are not yet what we shall be, but we are growing toward it, the process is not yet finished, but it is going on, this is not the end, but it is the road. All does not yet gleam in glory, but all is being purified." In our Christian lives, some things never change. We never stop needing the gospel of the forgiveness of sins. But other things do change. We are indeed being made new. We are always never the same.

It's a new year. Some things will change. Some things won't. As we continue to gather for worship in 2024, our unchanging Lord and his unchanging gospel will continue to bring grace to our old selves, making of us a new creation, and we will always never be the same.



The following note came with a Christmas card from Tony Polubinski, currently incarcerated at the Monroe Corrections Center, Monroe, WA.

He has deep roots with OHLC and is continuing to receive regular mailings with the newsletters, Sunday bulletins and sermons.

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ at OHLC,

It has been a year! I started the year at Stafford Creek *[in Aberdeen]*. In mid-April, God answered my prayers of 18 months, and I was transferred back to Monroe – Twin Rivers Unit. My transfer happened rather fast – on Monday my request was still awaiting a signature. By Wednesday, it was signed, and I was on the packout list for the following Monday's chain bus.

So in a matter of five days, I had to pack up for a transfer, including sending 2 boxes of books home, have an extended family visit and say goodbye to everyone at Stafford.

Since arriving at Monroe, I have returned to receiving weekly visits from various family members and returned to my twice-monthly church services. I'm having my 3rd extended family visit this month and have started my treatment program that I have been waiting almost 12 years for.

I am praying for and hopeful that upon completing treatment I will be eligible for graduated re-entry, which may get me home for my oldest nephew's high school graduation.

I thank you all for your continued prayers. Merry Christmas, and God bless.

Keeping Christmas

For the person who observes one day as especially sacred does it to
honor the Lord.Romans 14:6a, The Passion Translation

t is a good thing to observe Christmas Day. The mere marking of time and seasons, when people agree to stop work and make merry together, is a wise and wholesome custom. It helps one to feel the supremacy of the common life over the individual life. It reminds us to set our own little watch now and then, by the great clock of humanity which runs on sun time.

But there is a better thing than the observance of Christmas Day, and that is **keeping Christmas**.

Are you willing to forget what you have done for other people, and remember what other people have done for you; to ignore what the world owes you and to think what you owe the world; to put your rights in the background, and your duties in the middle distance, and your chances to do a little more than your duty in the foreground; to see that your neighbors are just as real as you are, and try to look behind their faces to their hearts, hungry for joy; to own that probably the only good reason for your existence is not what you are going to get out of life, but what you are going to give life; to

close your book on complaints against the management of the universe, and look around you for a place where you can sow a few seeds of happiness – are you willing to do these things even for a day?

Then you can keep Christmas.

Are you willing to stoop down and consider the needs and the desires of little children; to remember the weaknesses and loneliness of the people who are growing old; to stop asking how much your friends love you, and ask yourself whether you love them enough; to bear in mind the things that other people have to bear on their hearts; to try to understand what those who live in the same house with you really want, without waiting for them to tell you; to trim your lamp that it might give more light and less smoke, and to carry in front so your shadow will fall behind you; to make a grave for your ugly thoughts, and a garden for your kindly feelings, with the gate open – are you willing to do these things for even one day?

Then you can keep Christmas.

Are you willing to believe that love is the strongest thing in the world – stronger than hate, stronger than evil, stronger than death – and that the blessed life which began in Bethlehem more than two thousand years ago is the image and brightness of the Eternal Love?

Then you can keep Christmas.

And if you can keep it for a day, why not always?

But you can never keep it alone.
