Pastor's Page: Candy Hearts and Ashen Foreheads

"You are dust, and to dust you shall return." Genesis 3:19b "So teach us to number our days, that we might gain a heart of wisdom." Psalm 90:12

he new year has been tinged with sorrow for my wife and me. We know four couples in our age cohort who have lost spouses in the past few weeks (cancer, car accident, cancer, suicide). This steady barrage of heartbreaking news has made us weepy and sad in recent days. It has also, however, made us more tender-hearted towards one another. It has made us more patient with each other, more appreciative, more grateful. Our involvement in Marriage Encounter, both as participants and as a presenting couple, has long equipped us to cultivate these qualities in our relationship, but these painful reminders of how fragile and fleeting life truly is have shaken us out of the selfcenteredness which is the recurring default mode of human existence and towards each other with even deeper love and affection. It has made us see how easy it is to take each other for granted. And so we are sitting a little closer to each other on the couch. We are holding eye contact a little longer than usual. We are saying "I love you" with a little more urgency.

Being confronted with our mortality isn't fun. We live in a society which shields us from this reality most of the time, hiding it away as much as possible. "Age is just a number!" people say. "Not really!" the actuarial tables coldly respond. Our lives are filled with distractions, making it easy to live in denial of death. But sometimes things happen which make the reality of death impossible to deny. We are shaken out of our illusions, made to confront the truth that we are dust, and to dust we shall return.

This isn't fun. It isn't pleasant. But it can be helpful. As the psalmist says, numbering our days can give us wisdom. Confronting our mortality can give us a perspective on our lives and our relationships which takes us out of ourselves and makes us more tender-hearted towards others. It can help us to be more patient, more grateful. It can help us live our lives with greater intentionality and purpose.

This year Ash Wednesday falls on February 14th, which, of course, is also Valentine's Day. Many have chuckled at the odd juxtaposition of such a solemn day in the church year coinciding with the frivolity which marks our annual celebration of romantic love. Candy hearts and ashen foreheads don't seem to go together. But maybe they

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go together better than it seems at first glance. While there is much to be critical of when it comes to Valentine's Day – the forced gestures foisted upon every couple, the lonely ache of those who wish they were in a romantic relationship, the tacky takeover of a saint's day by commercial forces – even so, at its best, the day in an intentional celebration of love, even beyond that of romantic relationships. Yes, couples are nudged to smooch and woo each other. But there are numerous other acts of kindness and love which take place. School kids are taught to be expansive in their kindness by giving a valentine to each of their classmates. Single friends often reach out to each other in solidarity. Parents often give a little something to their kids, reminding them of their steadfast love.

Ash Wednesday only sharpens the urgency of showing love to others, whether to spouses or children or friends. It reminds us that we won't be around forever, and they won't be either. The perspective we gain as we are reminded that our days are numbered is invaluable as it sharpens our focus on what is important and what is not, giving us the wisdom to love more freely and selflessly. Wearing an ashen cross on your forehead on Valentine's Day and seeing an ashen cross on the forehead of the people you love can only make you more tender-hearted towards them, moving you to deeper appreciation, deeper love.

Ash Wednesday is a day of repentance. We confess the stubborn self-centeredness that sullies our relationship with God and our relationships with others, even the people we love most. But just as candy hearts are inscribed with messages of love, the ashes on our foreheads on that solemn day are a message of love inscribed upon us. The ashes are imposed in the shape of the cross, the sign of God's selfless love for us, the sign of Christ's ultimate victory over sin and death. It is God's valentine to us, with the message that death will not have the last word for us.

In the meantime, friends, let us number our days, that we would gain a heart of wisdom and love one another well.

Though many common Lenten practices rightly invite us to individual acts of "repentance, prayer and fasting, sacrificial giving and works of *love" – think of the popular spiritual practice of* giving something up for Lent – Lent is also a time for deepening of community.

As we move through this journey from sacrifice to service, we see it all come to a climax on Passion/Palm Sunday when Jesus enters Jerusalem, and when the passion reading reveals Jesus' ultimate act of service to us all: his death on the cross.

Journey with us this Lenten season as we are reminded of Jesus' love for us and his commandment to love one another, and as we look forward to the good news that awaits us all on Easter morning.

The "snowballs" are provided (they're crafted from remnants of our Blanket Workshop group's quilt batting), but the pizza will be real.


Join the Quest!


