

RASTOR'S RAGE: Counting our Blessings at OHLC

O give thanks to the LORD, call on his name, make known his deeds among the people! Psalm 105:1

Finally, beloved, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things.

Philippians 4:8

ne of my least favorite annual responsibilities as a pastor is completing our Annual Congregational Report to the churchwide organization. This report is roughly the congregational equivalent of doing your taxes. The forms include lots of boxes which need to be filled in with numbers: membership numbers, attendance numbers, financial numbers. I understand why it is important. I don't begrudge those who need that information. I always take it seriously and get it in on time. I just don't like numbers. I think words are much more interesting, which is probably why I'm a preacher and not an accountant. I don't like counting, and this report demands a lot of it.

However, this year as I was grumpily counting, one number jumped out and made me smile. The number was 24. That's how many new members we received at Oak Harbor Lutheran Church in the past calendar year, either by baptism, transfer, or affirmation of faith. Not only that, but this was 12 more members than we lost to transfers, removal, or death. Yes, Oak Harbor Lutheran Church grew in membership in 2023! Suddenly numbers didn't seem so bad! Suddenly they were fun! Like most Christian congregations, our membership numbers have at best plateaued in recent years. Like most Christian congregations, some years we have seen a dip in numbers. But not this past year. This past year we grew in membership. And while our worship attendance numbers are still not quite back to pre-pandemic levels, those numbers were up too.

I may not be a full convert to the joys of counting, but this was a reminder of the importance of a certain kind of counting, the counting of one's blessings. And there are more blessings to count at OHLC! This past Lent we had 60 people order a copy of
Luther's Large Catechism for our Lenten book
study, most of whom showed up consistently
for the class. This is the largest adult ed class
I've ever had the pleasure of teaching. Here is
another number to celebrate: 97. That's how many
new chairs a few of our members hauled back to OHLC
from the Burlington Costco. These chairs were
eventually matched by 12 new round tables. This was
made possible by a large number of dollars generously given to OHLC as
a memorial gift. (We'll keep that number in our financial report.) This
new furniture significantly brightened up our fellowship hall. The chairs
have been especially appreciated. One of our members described their
comfortable contours as "like receiving a hug from God." That's an
actual quote!

A word of caution is warranted here, I think. God's favor towards us cannot ultimately be counted by earthly blessings. As people of the cross, we know that God is not "more" with us when things are going well. God's greatest blessings, the blessings of faith, hope, and love, are not tied to our circumstances, which inevitably change. Moreover, while the weather has been good at OHLC recently, the overall climate for churches still poses significant challenges which we should not deny or ignore.

That said, it is always appropriate to give thanks. It is always appropriate to be grateful for the good things we have seen God doing. It is always good to count our blessings. "O give thanks to the LORD, call on his name, make known his deeds among the people!" writes the psalmist. "If there is anything worthy of praise," St. Paul encourages us, "think on these things."

There are 24 new people calling Oak Harbor Lutheran Church their spiritual home, which is 12 more than the previous year. I praise God for each one of them, and for each one of you. I guess counting isn't so bad after all.

A personal message about Stephen Ministry

April's focus is Stephen Ministry. We're honored to have the perspectives of someone who's been 'on both sides' of this caring ministry.

he relationship between a Stephen Minister and Care Receiver is confidential. I am stepping out of that confidentiality to encourage folks to take advantage of the blessing of Stephen Ministry. Twice in my life, when I was walking in my own "wilderness" of grief, pain, and anxiety, a caring woman has walked beside me for as long as I had need of her support, her encouragement and, most importantly, her compassionate listening.

You may recognize my identity by the details I am sharing in this note, and I would welcome conversation about my story. Fourteen years ago, as I comcompleted treatment for breast cancer, my husband died while in hospice care. A female Stephen Minister reached out to me, listened and comforted me, and over the course of several months helped me back to finding purpose and joy in my life. I became a Stephen Minister myself and have been able to share my gifts and training with two other women.

In 2023, I had a very difficult year. I had three surgeries and my daughter-in-law died after a long battle with cervical cancer. I was deeply depressed, anxious and in pain from the latest surgery. Once again, at my request, I was placed with a Stephen Minister. She listened to my fears and anxieties. She met me in that wilderness and walked beside me. Yes, we prayed together. Yes, we wept together, and came to laugh together as well.

I am sharing these experiences with you all to encourage and invite you to take advantage of this ministry. Certainly your own "wilderness" is different. Have no fear about acknowledging your need for help and support. Please talk to Pastor Jeff or Stephen Leaders Gaye Rodriguey and Gail Dobbyn, or to me. God bless you!

ollowing a successful and greatly-appreciated birdseed drive in 2023, Josephine Caring Community in Stanwood is again asking for our help. As noted in a newsletter article last summer, many Josephine residents were avid gardeners and love nature and the great outdoors. Quite a few residents have birdfeeders outside their windows. Studies show that birdwatching is helpful for those who are homebound, sharpening concentration, decreasing stress, and improving long-term health. Josephine goes through about 400 lbs. of birdseed each year, and the Activity Dept. does its best to stretch their budget to purchase seed for those who cannot afford it.

There will be a birdfeeder (you'll recognize it from last year's drive!) on a stand in the narthex donation center and we welcome your **monetary contributions** towards their birdseed fund. (*No actual birdseed, please!*) Checks may be written to OHLC, with *Josephine/Birdseed* on the memo line.

Josephine is also gathering **reading glasses** (2.5 mag or greater) and **washable wool yarn** for projects (used and remnant balls are also welcomed).

Josephine is reaching out to many area shelters by assembling personal care kits. We at OHLC wish to help by collecting **new hand towels** and **new, travel-sized toiletries such as shampoo, toothpaste, body wash, lip balm and toothbrushes.** These items may be placed in the marked collection bin in the narthex during April & May.

Do you enjoy sewing? Please talk to Rita Carter, who has a template for sewing personal care kit containers from hand towels. The work can be done independently, and only simple, machine-stitching in a straight line is required.
