Pastor's Page: Evangelism Lessons from St. Patrick

Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age."

Matthew 28:19-20

t. Patrick's Day is known to be a day of revelry. In fact, I saw a recent story on a business news website which said that St. Patrick's Day is the highest grossing day of the year for U.S. bars, with a whopping 174% increase in beer sales. Much of the beer sold is Ireland's famous Guinness stout, while other sales include pitchers and pints of light American lagers turned green with a drop of food coloring. I've always thought this was a bizarre way to celebrate a saint's day, and especially Patrick's. After all, Patrick was actually British, not Irish. He was a Christian missionary, not a drunken leprechaun. He didn't bring green beer to Ireland. He brought the gospel. I don't mean to be a party pooper, but perhaps a more appropriate way to celebrate would be with tea and crumpets at a Bible study.

In all seriousness, Patrick, who died on March 17, 461 A.D., continues to offer some lessons in evangelism for the church today. At the age of sixteen, Patrick was captured by Irish pirates from his home in Britain and taken as a slave to Ireland. He managed to escape after spending six years in slavery to his pagan captors. He credited his Christian faith for helping carry him through those brutal years, and after making his way back home to Britain he studied for the ministry and was ordained as a priest. Eventually he returned to Ireland as a missionary. He



wrote that he was motivated to share the gospel by "the zeal of God, the truth of Christ, and the love of neighbors and friends." (*Letter*, 1) In explaining his decision to return to the very people who had enslaved him, he wrote: "It is from within me that holy mercy arises which I show towards this people." (*Letter*, 10)

Patrick is a good example of what is sometimes called relational evangelism. This is the oldest and most effective form of evangelism there is. Unlike the attractional model, which seeks to draw new members through attractive programs and entertainment-style worship, in the relational model Christians go out to others, meeting them where they are. Rather than trying to lure others into our Christian enclaves, we go out into the world, interacting with and hopefully befriending others, sincerely caring for them until we are given an opportunity to witness to our faith or invite them to our church.

Numerous surveys have been conducted by church growth organizations, and the results have been pretty consistent for a long time now. About 2% of new churchgoers say they started coming because they saw an advertisement. About 6% came because they were invited by the pastor. Another 6% said they came because of an organized evangelism campaign. *An overwhelming 86% said they came because they were invited by friends or relatives.* Relational evangelism works. It isn't easy. It isn't a quick fix. But it works.

As our culture becomes more secular – more pagan even – and more hostile to Christian faith, it is tempting to become resentful of those who do not share our faith, our values, our worldview. We become especially resentful when we feel we are being treated poorly. However, this must not become an excuse for an unloving attitude towards our unbelieving and increasingly hostile neighbors. Resentment will bring exactly no one to faith in Christ. Patrick evangelized an entire country not with zeal and truth alone, but also with love of neighbor and with holy mercy.

Sadly, modern Ireland is looking more and more like the pagan Ireland of the fifth century, having recently been described as the most rapidly secularizing country in Europe. Our country is going through a similar trend of secularization as worship attendance is in sharp decline in the United States and Christianity is treated with contempt by many social elites. Patrick can show us the way once again. His bravery can embolden us to "go," carrying out the Great Commission by going out into the world Christ came to save to make disciples. We need to go out with zeal, yes, but we also need love. People won't care about what we know if they don't know that we care. We need truth, absolutely, but we also need holy mercy towards the very people who sometimes treat us poorly.

St. Patrick's Day falls on a Sunday this year. Forget the green beer. The most St. Patricky thing you could possibly do would be to invite a friend to church.



Jacob: an astronaut Hannah: a doctor






