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PASTOR'S PAGE:

Now and Not Yet - Advent and the Christian Life

"This life therefore is not righteousness, but growth in righteousness; not health, but healing; not being, but becoming; not rest, but exercise. We are not yet what we shall be, but we are growing toward it. The process is not yet finished, but it is going on. This is not the end, but it is the road. All does not yet gleam in glory, but all is being purified."

love the season of Advent. I love the sense of anticipation. I love the reflective, longing, minor key hymns interspersed with hints of joy. I love the delightfully strange mixing of tenses as we ponder Christ's past coming, present coming, and future coming. I love Advent especially because it points to an underacknowledged but widely experienced aspect of the Christian life, which is the paradoxical "now, but not yet," nature of salvation.

The Bible's teaching on salvation is complex. Take St. Paul's teaching on it, for instance. At times the Apostle describes salvation as a done deal. In Ephesians 2:8 he boldly states: "For by grace you have been saved through faith." There is no equivocation here, nothing left undone. Salvation is a completed work. In 1 Corinthians 1:18, however, Paul describes Christians as "those who are being saved." Here salvation is described as an ongoing process, unfolding in the present. And then there is Romans 5:9-10, where salvation is clearly referred to as a future event, a future hope. Twice in these two verses Paul states that we "will be saved." It isn't quite done. Not yet.

This complexity is not intended to undermine one's confidence in one's salvation. It shouldn't introduce fear or uncertainty about whether someone is saved or not. Rather, it describes the reality of how we experience salvation. It is something that is now, but not yet. We are at the same time completely redeemed by Christ, and we are works in progress. God is still working on us. God still has a future in store for us that has not yet come.

You know this is true in your own life. It is certainly true in mine. The Spirit writes God's law on our hearts, setting them to obey, while the old sinner in us continues to surface with all of his or her self-centered, self-justifying shenanigans. The righteousness in which we are clothed as a gift through Christ

is like any other hand-me-down — it doesn't quite fit us at first and often drapes over us awkwardly as we learn to wear it well. We have moments of Christ-like kindness, patience, and grace, and then when we're overtired or hangry or frustrated, we snarl at strangers and loved ones alike. We find real, tangible healing for certain areas of our lives, only to discover new ways to be hurt or that old scabs are easily torn off. We come to moments of profound understanding and insight as the gospel reaches a new corner of our intellect, and then find ourselves confounded again by some new spiritual knot we can't seem to untangle. We have times when God seems so close, when God's love warms us and fills us with joy, and times when a chilly distance sets in, when we long for that warmth, that assurance. Salvation is now, and it is not yet.

Advent is a season to embrace this complexity. During the Advent season it can sometimes feel like we're pretending that Christ hasn't already been born as we emphasize the themes of waiting and preparation. But what we're really waiting and preparing for is for the work begun in Bethlehem to be completed – in us, and in our world. During Advent, we revisit the promises spoken by the prophets to remember that God's people had seasons of waiting and preparation before, and the same promises which sustained them now sustain us. And even as we acknowledge the "not yet," we find hope in the "now" of Christ coming to us in the present through Word and Sacrament. Past, present, and future are woven together as we focus our attention on Jesus, "who is, and who was, and who is to come." (Revelation 1:8)

Advent is so much more than a countdown to Christmas. It is a season to embrace the complexity of salvation. It is a season to wait and prepare, to look back and to look forward, to take hold of Christ and his promises in every tense. It is a season which resonates powerfully with an often-unacknowledged aspect of Christian life, which is that we experience salvation as something that is now and also not yet.

So embrace this season. Come to worship, in-person and often. Mark the season in your home with candles and wreaths and calendars and devotions. As you wait and prepare, remember that Christ has already graced the earth with his holy presence as the Child born in Bethlehem. Remember that he comes to you now through his Holy Word and Holy Sacraments. And remember that he will one day come again to finish what he's begun. He isn't done with this world, or with you. Not yet.


Carol Stone and Ken Lindh were united in marriage at OHLC on Monday, November 25. We wish them every blessing as they begin life together as husband and wife!



This Holiday Season, Offer the Gift of Remembering to Those Who Are Grieving, Part 2

With the holidays quickly approaching, . . . people often avoid those who are grieving, uncertain what to say or do. But there's a simple, powerful way anyone can offer care: giving the gift of remembering the grieving person's loved one with them.



Listening to and Sharing Memories

Once you've opened the door to remembering, be ready to listen to the grieving person's memories. Sharing memories is a way for them to express their love for the deceased, feel closer to their lost loved one, and experience comfort. Although a grieving person can certainly reflect and remember on their own, there's something special about sharing memories with someone who will listen and care. Whether they're sharing happy memories, sad stories about the deceased's final days, funny anecdotes, or somber reflections, your being there to listen sends a clear message: You are not alone. Each conversation is different. Some people may want to talk and talk, while others may be eager to hear your recollections about their loved one. It varies by individual, so follow the other person's lead. Stay focused on their needs, and you'll be on the right track to providing meaningful care.

Embracing Every Emotion

One reason people often hesitate to bring up someone's loss is because they're worried about how the grieving person might respond. Memories of a loved one may bring strong emotions—anger, sadness, loneliness, regret—as well as the tears that often come with such feelings. It can be uncomfortable to encounter these strong feelings because we don't know what to say or do. But here's a secret: Usually, the best response is simply to listen and embrace whatever emotions might come. You don't have to say exactly the right thing; in fact, trying to find the perfect words often leads to clichés, platitudes, or other unhelpful responses. In contrast, listening to, accepting, and validating a grieving person's emotions brings comfort. Of course, it isn't always easy to listen as someone cries, expresses anger, or shares how lonely they feel. But when you set aside your discomfort and focus on being present with the other person, you'll be providing exactly the kind of care they need.

Making the Holidays a Little Easier

Grief has no expiration date. Whether it's been a year, two years, or longer since someone lost a loved one, consider offering the gift of remembering to them, too. No matter how long it's been, listening and reminiscing together is a wonderful way to bring comfort, deepen relationships, offer care, and bring Christ's healing love to those who are hurting during the holidays. Doing that can make a difficult holiday season a little easier.

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LOVING YOUR NEIGHBOR

he value of listening and being slow to speech and anger, may seem in short supply in our American culture. Social media urges us to keep posting, generate followers, and comment on what everyone else is saying. Cultural divides deepen as we lose the skills to listen to the thoughtful positions of those who differ from us.

The author of the Biblical book of James advises us to listen and keep calm—timeless advice! Biblical scholars say that although James is located in the epistles (or letters) section of the New Testament, it is in the genre of wisdom literature. James was written for an early Christian community determining how to live as Christians in the world.

Read through James 1 to find several nuggets of wisdom, which lead to a specific end of the chapter: "Religion that is pure and undefiled before God, the Father, is this: to care for orphans and widows in their distress" (James 1: 27). The point of wisdom and right action isn't to be puffed up with our own smarts, but to use our wisdom and gifts to care for others, particularly the most vulnerable. Like James' community, we would be wise to listen.

Reflect: To whom do you find it easy to listen? To whom do you find it more difficult to listen? Where is God calling you to listen next?

Pray: God, you hear the cries of our hearts. Help us tune in to our neighbors to hear their joys and sorrows, too. Amen.
