

# Pastor's Page:

## The Most Epic Council Meeting Ever

2025 marks the 1700<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the most epic church council meeting ever. This council meeting didn't debate the color of the carpet in the sanctuary or what kind of coffee to serve for fellowship time. This council meeting was called to sort out what is perhaps the most perennially urgent theological issue in Christianity: Who is Jesus, really? This council meeting went on for an entire month, from mid-May to mid-June in the year 325. (I've been to some council meetings that seemed that long.) Their endurance paid off. It is no exaggeration to say that, after the Bible, this council meeting produced the most important Christian text ever written. We know it today as the Nicene Creed.

What prompted Emperor Constantine to convene this council meeting of elders from across the Christian church was a small but growing misunderstanding about Jesus. A pastor in Alexandria, Egypt, named Arius was teaching that Jesus was something less than truly God. Contrary to clear statements in scripture about the full divinity of Christ, including Jesus' own statement that "the Father and I are one" (John 10:30), Arius started flirting with the platonic philosophy popular in his day, which led him to begin describing Jesus as a creation of God, of a different substance from the true God. This gets very esoteric very quickly, but the essence of the problem was that by using this language, Jesus was getting downgraded to something less than scripture says he is.

The impact of this misunderstanding was to turn Christians into pagans, worshipping a created thing. Christians worship Jesus as Lord, as God, and if Jesus is something less than fully God, Christians are worshipping an idol. Whether or not Constantine understood all the theological implications at stake, he could see that Arius' teaching was causing much confusion and consternation among Christians, and so he called for a meeting to be held in the city of Nicaea (in modern day Turkey) to sort it all out.

You've probably heard the old joke that "a camel is a horse designed by a committee." It is often true that committees aren't the most effective route to excellence, but this was not the case here. Far from it. The Council of Nicaea produced a statement not only of great theological precision, but also of great beauty, describing Jesus as "eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father." The Nicene Creed expanded upon the Apostles' Creed, using this magnificent language describing the divinity of Christ to state explicitly what is

implicit in the older, shorter creed. It also took the "I believe" from the Apostles' Creed, which arose as a baptismal statement for adult converts, and changed it to "We believe," to make it a confession of faith for the whole Christian church to celebrate and affirm together. The "we" stuck. 1700 years later, the Nicene Creed is the most widely used confession of faith in the Christian church. To this day, it is recited regularly in worship by the vast majority of Christians across the globe. In our Lutheran tradition, we recite the Nicene Creed during Advent and Christmas, throughout the Easter season, and on festival Sundays.

In steering the church away from the misunderstandings of Arius, the Council of Nicaea produced a summary statement of the Christian faith which continues to serve the church well today. It provides a cornerstone of Christian unity which transcends many of our denominational lines. Regular recitation of the creed provides an inoculation of sorts for Christians against the pervasive misleading philosophies of our own day, which are still always trying to downgrade Jesus. The Nicene Creed perpetually calls the church back to the essence of who Christ is and what he has done "for us and for our salvation."

In celebration of the 1700<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the most epic church council meeting ever, we will be focusing on the Nicene Creed this Lent, both for our Sunday morning Adult Education and our midweek services. Come learn more about who Jesus really is, and what he has done for you. Come worship the One who is really, truly, and fully God.
