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Body Language: The Sign of the Cross

“Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? Therefore we have been buried with him by baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life. For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we will certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his.”

Romans 6:3-5

Some people are surprised to find so many people at OHLC making the sign of the cross over themselves at various points in our worship service. Those who come from a Roman Catholic background are certainly familiar with the practice but sometimes come to us not realizing that Lutherans do it too. Those visiting or joining from other Protestant Christian traditions are also sometimes surprised to see something that looks so “Catholic.” Even life-long Lutherans, perhaps from certain regions of the country or from other Lutheran traditions, are sometimes surprised for the same reason.

Is making the sign of the cross a “Catholic” thing? It is! But it isn’t just a capital “C” Catholic practice, referring to the Roman Catholic church. It is also a small “c” catholic practice, referring to the whole Christian church. The sign of the cross is widely used in many Christian traditions, including but not limited to the Roman Catholic church. Anglicans do it. Eastern Orthodox do it. A growing number of Protestants do it.

But is it Lutheran? It is if you do it right. Let me explain. Martin Luther himself encouraged the practice of making the sign of the cross not only in worship but every morning and every evening. In fact, this practice is commended in Luther’s most important and influential work, the Small Catechism. There he writes, “In the morning, as soon as you get out of bed, you are to make the sign of the cross and say, “God the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit watch over me. Amen.” And then: “In the evening, when you go to bed, you are to make the sign of the holy cross and say, “God the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, watch over me. Amen.”

So is it Lutheran? If it is recommended in the Small Catechism of Martin Luther, I think it is safe to say that it is! However, to practice it in a manner consistent with Lutheran theology, it must be done in freedom. If it burdens the conscience, perhaps due to previous associations with the practice, it need not be done. If it feels superstitious (or even a little “stitious”), it need not be done. If it

doesn’t fit with your piety or upbringing, it need not be done. To do it “Lutheranly” is to do it in Christian freedom, without any assumption that you “have to” or that you are a lesser Christian for not.

But why do it at all? The practice of making the sign of the cross is connected to baptism. It is a physical way to call to mind what happened in one’s baptism. As St. Paul writes in Romans 6, when we are baptized we are joined to Christ’s death and resurrection. The salvation Jesus won on the cross is given to us personally. To make the sign of the cross is to employ our entire bodies in remembering that in our baptism we have been marked with the cross of Christ, and because we have been so marked, our sin is forgiven and we belong to him both now and forever.

Body language can be an important way to communicate. Whether it is the presiding minister making the sign of the cross over the congregation in blessing, or an individual Christian making the sign of the cross in the morning, or the evening, or in response to the absolution, or when walking past the baptismal font, or when receiving Holy Communion, the body language is powerful. It reminds us that what happened on the cross covers us, claims us, and has saved us. Muscle memory is important too. Repeated physical motions imprint information in us. What information could be more important to imprint than that we have been joined forever to Christ’s death and resurrection?

Making the sign of the cross is a widely used practice across the entire Christian church. It has been part of Lutheran Christianity since Martin Luther. It is a beautiful and meaningful gesture for many people, signifying that the salvation won for us by our Lord Jesus has been personally given to us in Holy Baptism. But for Lutherans, Christian freedom trumps Christian tradition every time. If it isn’t specifically commanded in scripture, it is optional. So give it a try, or don’t. It’s up to you. Either way, remember that in your baptism you have been joined to the saving work of Christ we celebrate this month during Holy Week and Easter. In your baptism, the salvation Jesus accomplished was imparted to you personally. Remember that in your baptism you have been marked, body and soul, with the cross of Christ forever.

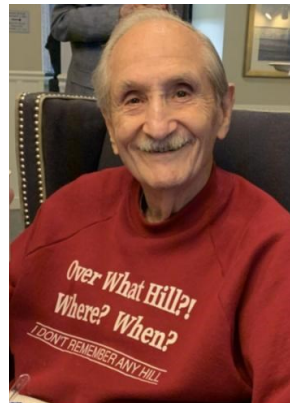

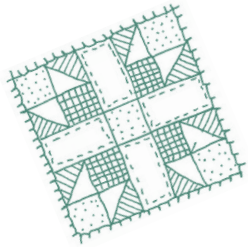


Sacred Hope in Action

ISAIAH 62: 1A, "FOR ZION'S SAKE, I WILL NOT KEEP SILENT."

This reading sounds like God is ensuring we are basking in great joy, hope, and excitement of life forever with God! One of the first images that comes to my mind was standing on the sidewalk outside our elementary school when I saw the doors to the school erupt with the presence of running Kindergartners and First Graders as they raced to the playground for recess. While they raced, everyone was screaming at the top of their lungs in pure joy.

I'd watched that many times before, but on this day, I was struck with the wonder of these little people running with the greatest excitement toward the playground, their refuge of fun, laughter, and play.

This passage begins with, "Regarding Zion, I can't keep my mouth shut." Biblical references tell us that Zion is used to describe a place designated by the Lord where followers can live and serve God.

Could Zion be where we are? Isn't that always where God is, too? So, no matter our circumstances, we can still live in our refuge of faith and experience fun, laughter, and play as children of God. Would God not want it any other way? Despite the woes of the world, we can still run toward our holy playground, which is the hope we have in a God who is love! We run, screaming with joy, laughing with hope, and fall into a gracious God's open arms of love!



Reflect: What mantra can you design to remind you that Zion, the place where we can live and serve God, is everywhere in every part of our day? Then, use it in places that are often difficult, like work, meetings, neighborhoods, and other challenging places.

Pray: Gracious God, we dwell on your holy playground where peace, hope, and joy abide. Your presence is love, and may we always serve you and our neighbors with grateful hearts. Amen.

UPDATE ON MUNCHY MONDAY

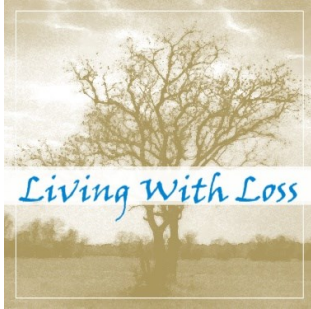

STEPHEN MINISTRY

The Safe House

One way we like to describe the role of a Stephen Minister is that they provide a **Safe House** for care receivers. The Safe House is a place where you can safely share your deepest feelings. It's a setting where you don't have to worry about being embarrassed, judged, or rejected.

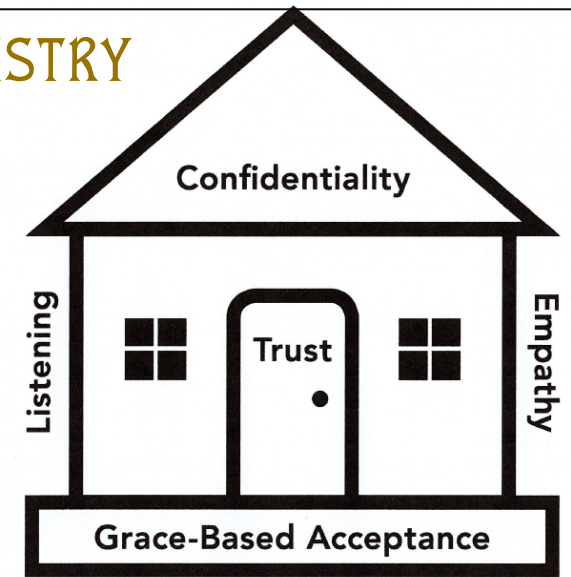
The foundation of the Safe House is *grace-based acceptance*. Your Stephen Minister will *accept* you unconditionally, *care* for you as Jesus does, and *value* you as a person made in the image of God. They won't judge you for feeling the way you feel or for what you've said or done. Because God graciously accepts each of us in Jesus, Stephen Ministers likewise accept their care receivers.

One wall of the Safe House is *listening*. Your Stephen Minister will actively listen to you, being fully present with you. They won't try to tell you what to do, psychoanalyze you, or focus on what they're going to say next—they'll pay full attention to you because your thoughts and feelings are important.

The other wall is *empathy*. That means your Stephen Minister will connect at a deep level with your feelings, experiencing them along with you and letting you know their understanding of your feelings.

The roof is *confidentiality*. Your Stephen Minister knows that to feel safe sharing your feelings, anything you share needs to be kept between the two of you. Confidentiality is a main topic of their training, and all Stephen Ministers are committed to protecting it in their caring relationships.

And finally, the doorway into the Safe House is *trust*. Your Stephen Minister will maintain a trusting relationship with you, opening the door to honest, meaningful, and healing sharing of your feelings.

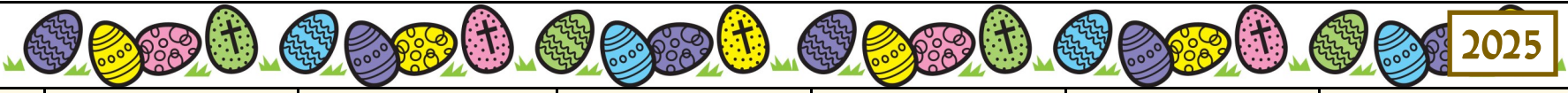
